Greetings friends,

I've mentioned this in years past but it bears repeating: Many pastors I've encountered (and

many Elders, for that matter) are squeamish about discussing money. In some ways, talking about tithing (which ultimately touches upon one's annual salary) touches on one the last great taboos in our culture. I have never understood this taboo and I certainly don't mind talking about money. In fact, I love to talk about money! Imagine how a family would function if no one in the family was able to discuss the family finances! Our church family is no different. And if we honestly look to scripture to direct our lives, we find that Jesus was hardly squeamish when it came to discussing money – nor were the prophets. Money is essential to live and to our common ministry and there is no getting around that!

Stewardship within the church is about making choices, as individuals and in community, as much as it is about money. It is more than giving money to the church. Stewardship is about being faithful disciples, caring for and managing all that God has given us. Stewardship is not just one part of Christian discipleship; it involves every aspect of life in all the stages of life. Stewardship is the grateful response to God's grace and goodness. It requires a consideration of how our choices affect us and others, of how we can be good caretakers of the created world, and of how we can best serve God as disciples of Christ. I hope you will join me this month in casting aside this taboo and in engaging in a serious and honest conversation about Stewardship and the choices we make as a congregation. As we huddle down in our warm sanctuary and we contemplate all of the ways that God has been good to us, let us prayerfully and truthfully consider how God calls us all to give. A Thank You from the Bride & Groom Families


Dear Friends,
